## Safety check

## BHTA: Concern about damage to island's image

CHAIRMAN OF THE Barbados Hotel and Tourism Association (BHTA) Javon Griffith has expressed Jeep concern over the potential impact of escalating gun violence on the Island's tourism industry.

Speaking at a press conference held yesterday by the Barbados Private Sector Association (BPSA) at the Goddard's Building, Haggatt Hall, St Michael, Griffith highlighted the importance of safety as a core element of Barbados' tourism brand and emphasised the immediate threat posed when visitors no longer feel secure.

"Well, what I would say first and foremost is that we are a destination which has safety listed as one of its brand planks. So as soon as persons no longer feel safe in the destination, that becomes an immediate threat to the tourism industry and it's something which our members are very concerned about," Griffith stated.

He underscored the swift response of governments in key source markets, noting that travel advisories could be issued rapidly in response to heightened violence, deterring potential visitors.

#### **Travel advisories**

"We know from previous instances where this has happened, that the governments in our source markets can be very quick to issue travel advisories for their citizens against travelling to certain parts of the world because of escalated levels of violence," he soid.

The timing of these concerns was particularly critical as Barbados approaches the main events of the Crop Over Festival, he noted. Griffith pointed to the industry's heightened awareness and proactive stance in addressing the issue.

This is something which we are very actively aware of and something which we hope it doesn't come to, especially over the next two weeks in this lead-up to the main events of our Crop Over Pestival," he said.

Reflecting on recent events, Griffith described the past three weeks as "nothing short of shocking" for those involved in the tourism sector. He expressed a collective hope that the situation would be swiftly resolved to prevent further damage to the island's

reputation as a safe and desirable travel destination. As of mid-July 2024, Barbados reported a total of 27 homicides for this year.

Police Commissioner Richard Boyce, in a recent press conference, said law enforcement officers were working diligently to address the situation.

Government also revealed plans to reintroduce amendments to the Bail Act, which would prevent those charged with murder and serious gun offences from obtaining bail within the first two years on remand.

# Words 'not sufficient' to combat violence

Acknowledging the complexity
of the issue, Tannis stressed that
words alone were not sufficient
to combat violence. However, she
underscored that words could be a
precursor to action, suggesting an
overhaul in the approach to
day-to-day interactions as
answers are sought to concerns
about conflict resolution.

Tannis called for a multi-

dimensional approach, involving the wider private sector, law enforcement and community organisations to address the root causes of anger and violence. She emphasised the need to build character, discipline and wholesome behaviour, particularly among the youth. She noted that while the country had realised economic growth at the macro level, there was the prevailing view that this was not felt on the ground.

"Since COVID-19 and its devastating consequences in our economy, Barbados has realised economic growth, but we will all agree that economic growth alone is not what is required for a nation to thrive," she remarked. The BPSA chairman

The BPSA chairman encouraged increased investment in youth programmes, support for mental health and addiction treatment services and a review of existing gun control measures to ensure responsible ownership and curb illegal weapon importation. Tannis also stressed the importance of maintaining Barbados' identity and security for both residents and visitors.

"Together, we must be determined to ensure that Barbados remained a country built and sustained on the hard work of our foreparents," she declared.

Tannis said the business community stood willing to put their money where their mouth was, noting they were awaiting instructions from the relevant authorities as to where contributions would be most impactful. She cited past

contributions, such as supporting police outposts and engaging in dialogue with the Attorney General's office. "We have a proud history of

lending, financially and tangibly, whenever called upon," she said. However, Tannis urged a shift in focus to preventative measures addressing issues in homes, schools and churches to prevent young males from falling prey to criminal activities. She called for a comprehensive understanding of the motivations behind these actions and the development of a non-partisan rescue mechanism.

to engage the youth meaningfully. She reaffirmed the BPSA's commitment to working alongside public officials and community leaders to implement effective strategies to reduce crime and promote peace and security. She emphasised the serious impact of crime on businesses and the broader society, stating: "We cannot live in fear in our homes because there are relatively few elements that are being highly incentivised to do whatever it is that they do and not care about the innocent failout."
