CEO: Finals Plan B in place

THE NATIONAL CULTURAL FOUNDATION (NCF) has already booked an indoor space should bad weather affect the staging of the Pic O De Crop Finals scheduled for next week Friday at the National Botanical Gardens, Waterford, St Michael.

While details on the alternative venue were not revealed, chief executive officer of the NCF, Carol Roberts, said all efforts remained on preparing the space at **Botanical Gardens** to hold the marquee event.

"For Pic O De Crop, we've already begun to have some early conversations with tent managers. We could not have conversations with the finalists because, as you are well aware, the last tent was judged last night [Tuesday]. Bright and early as tomorrow we begin to have the conversations with them.

"We've already booked an indoor space as a Plan B, but we are moving ahead to ensure that the space in **Botanical Gardens** is made fit for purpose, for the requirements of the finalists and mindful of the issues we had last year," she said.

Last week, a statement released by the NCF stated that some occasional showers hampered the full technical setup and rehearsal needed ahead of the Scotiabank Junior Monarch Finals set to be held at the **Botanical Gardens** last Saturday. Following consultation with parents, sponsors, judges and other key stakeholders, the event was postponed.

The Scotiabank Junior Monarch Finals will now take place tonight at 7 at the Garfield Sobers Sports Complex in Wildey, St Michael. With the Pic O De Crop Finals set for next week, president of the Barbados Association of Creatives and Artistes, Sean Carter, said calypsonians questioned the alternative venue in advance instead of having to make last-minute adjustments to possible presentations.

Roberts explained that the process of postponing an event or establishing a Plan B required a holistic process which considered the available dates, venues and the required set up.

"We understand the angst of various sub-sectors in producing an event, but it is trying to get that delicate balance to the satisfaction of all. Will you strike that balance 100 per cent of the time? Absolutely not, but our intention and our aim is to satisfy as many concerns, sensitivities or desires as possible," she said.

"The other thing is that the success of the event does not rely on the NCF alone. You have mammoth teams, both governmental and non-governmental, who are critical to the success of the event. Whether it is DEM; whether it is

the Police Service; the Defence Force; the health inspectors; whether it is the people who operate the drones; whether it's the vendors.

"It was not an easy decision for the NCF, after the heavy rain and the consistent rain of last week Wednesday to say . . . we are not going to be able to get the required rehearsals in to be able to let these young people show off to the best of their abilities," she added.

Roberts said that the NCF consults with the Barbados Meteorological Services weekly for relatively accurate predictions on the weather forecast. This, she said, was both for rain and extreme heat.

"It's not just about rain, it's about weather in general. I don't think we can deny that it's kind of a different meteorological environment over the last several years. With the event it's not only weather or the rain falls on the day, but any sustained rainfall also severely hampers set-up, rehearsals, technical rehearsals, dress rehearsals.

"The one thing you cannot pin on us or blame us for is the weather condition and therefore, mindful of what we cannot control, we are taking every step to put in place arrangements that we the collective team can control in the best interest of the calypsonians," she concluded.
