Griffith: More varied summer camps this year

MINISTER OF YOUTH, Sport and Community Empowerment, Charles Griffith thinks the activities on offer at this year's national summer camps will be significantly more diverse and practical than ever before.

Speaking from his office at the Ministry's headquarters at Haggatt Hall last Friday, Griffith said that after careful consideration, the ministry recognised the importance of greatly diversifying the portfolio of activities available since the inception of the camps in 1996.

"In times before, many of the activities at the national camps would have consisted of various types of arts and craft. We found it important to implement activities that would not only be more age appropriate for young people around the age of 15, but we also wanted to make sure we could hold their interest.

"We are aware of the current climate in the country as it pertains to the younger population and we therefore see it imperative to incorporate life skills in terms of conflict resolution, decision-making and team building at the core of everything because we see the importance of imparting these concepts on our youth," he said.

Griffith also emphasised the camps are not for babysitting, but more so to provide a structured, safe environment that will impact the lives of the young

The camps, which were in existence from 1996, will run from July 22 to August 23, operating from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. from Mondays to Fridays at 46 locations islandwide.

Youth Commissioner and National Camps programme coordinator Carolyn Garnes spoke in detail about the new activities at this year's camps.

"There are 47 camps and within those camps, two will cover digital media, 13 will cover summer arts which will see facilitators come into the camps to teach hair braiding, nail technology, dance and drama. We will also be looking to take those campers to NIFCA this year and we will be having a showcase later down.

Inter-camp meet

"We are also doing an athletic inter-camp meet and also introducing them to the field of robotics. Because the age range of the campers are ages four to 15, art and craft will still be available for the much younger members of the camp. Here at the ministry, our national camps programme is targeting around 3 500 young people and this is excluding the enrolment at the National Sports Council camp," she said.

Garnes added that they were looking for members of the public to offer themselves as volunteers to assist at the camps.

"We want to bring back volunteerism as a way

of giving back. We have had students from the University of the West Indies, Barbados Community College and the Samuel Jackman Prescod Institute who have given back hours through working with the camps, so at the moment we have training going on for all of our camp staff," said Garnes.

Additionally, for the first time in the national

The Ministry of Education is also partnering with the Ministry of Youth and Sports through their summer nutrition programme, which will ensure all campers are adequately fed for the duration of the camp.

Chefette Restaurants is also on board and will be offering all campers tours of their facilities.
